
Pennsylvania Brings in \$1.99 Billion in Revenue Collections

General Fund revenue collections for the month of October were \$1.99 billion, which was \$80 million less than expected.

Collections of \$32 million for corporation taxes came in below Department of Revenue projections by \$27 million. Sales tax collections of \$774 million were lower than expected, coming in \$52 million below the official estimate. The Personal Income Taxes collected were \$866 million, which was below estimate by \$20 million.

For the 2016-17 Fiscal Year, General Fund collections of \$10.84 billion are below the official estimate by \$262 million.
